This year's book selection features "The Apple Orchard Riddle" by Margaret McNamara and highlights the apple industry in New York which is economically and nutritionally essential. This story helps students learn about the many jobs and processes of an apple orchard. An accompanying activity also allows the students to learn about the science behind apple oxidation. New York is the second largest apple producer in the nation. A leader in apple research, Cornell University has developed more than 65 varieties since 1880. New York produces over 29.5 million bushels of apples each year and provides jobs for 17,500 people.

"Ag Literacy Week is a chance for Franklin County to increase Agricultural Literacy while celebrating our county's rich agricultural heritage," stated Diane Dumont, 4-H Educator with Cornell Cooperative Extension Franklin County.
